The Collect: O Lord, raise up we pray, your power and come among us, and with great might succour us; that whereas, through our sins and wickedness we are grievously hindered in running the race that is set before us, your bountiful grace and mercy may speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy Spirit, be honour and glory, now and for ever.

The Additional Collect: Almighty God, purify our hearts and minds, that when your Son Jesus Christ comes again as judge and saviour we may be ready to receive him, who is our Lord and our God.

Bible readings Isaiah 40, 1-11 2 Peter 3, 8-15a Mark 1, 1-8

Reflection

Do parents still sing lullabies to their babies? I hope so. I remember singing *The King of Love my Shepherd is* to my children and later my grandchildren to settle them to sleep. I don't have a good singing voice but it worked. If I'd been a Hebrew woman at the time of Isaiah, the lullaby I sang might have contained the word *Nechamu*, the first word of our Old Testament reading. Comfort ye... be comforted! Imagine soothing a fretful child with the words... "There, there...It's alright, it's alright..."

Now, imagine if you will, a small child who has behaved badly, has been reprimanded, and as every good parent knows, needs to be assured that they're still loved.

'Comfort ye'.... Those words begin what is known as 'the Book of Consolation to Israel' from the prophet Isaiah. Chapters 1-39 have warned of God's judgment if people put their trust in secular rulers rather than in God. But then it changes.... Chapters 40-55 speak of the promise of redemption. No sooner is judgment pronounced than words of comfort come. Yahweh – God – has punished Jerusalem for their sins, but his purpose was not harsh punishment, but rescue. He allowed them to suffer in order to restore them to their former status as his chosen people – a status that they never fully lost, but that they compromised by their unfaithfulness.

These words speak to a people in turmoil. They had suffered double for their sins (v 2) Isaiah begs them to return to God and to remember his covenant with them. It is a song of comfort to a confused and scattered people, a reminder that God's word and love stand forever.

A reprimanded child then, comforted by a loving father. A lovely image!

Now another image. Isaiah ch40 v3 is echoed in the Gospel reading, with another prophet... John the Baptist. (Mark ch1 v3) ³ A voice of one calling: "In the wilderness prepare the way for the LORD."

In ancient times when a visiting ruler was expected, it was customary to do some maintenance on the local roads, where harsh desert conditions would have brought rocks to surface, and flash floods would have created uneven ground. John the Baptist with his outlandish clothes and austere lifestyle calls the people into the desert, that through that desolation they might come to renewal. He calls them to '*a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.*'

The wilderness of our lives and the desert of our hearts require preparation for receiving our Lord, perhaps through some sort of Advent spiritual discipline, prayer, scripture reading, honest worship and pure lives. And that can be just as hard work as shifting rocks!

Let us return to the image of that reprimanded child who, knowing they are in disgrace, wants to say 'Sorry Daddy' and be forgiven. As we come to this strange Covid-Christmas, we are together experiencing a time of Lament, a time of grieving for the past, in a world that seems to many to be a wilderness.

But in the midst of it all, let us listen for the song of our Lord and Saviour... *Comfort ye...*
